

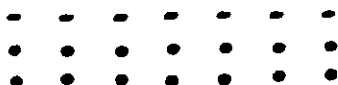

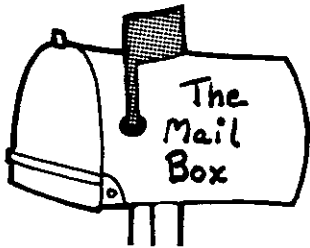

FORGEY, CLINTON b in Union Twp., 9-12-1831, son of Alexander b 12-5-1797, d 1878 & Lucy (ELKINS) b 5-12-1800. He md in 1856 Mary WAKEFIELD b 4-12-1835, dau. of Benjamin & Parthena (JUDD). Benjamin b 8-15-1809 and wife b 4-18-1815.

GILLETT, ELISHA b Rome Twp., 8-18-1821, son of Joel & Azuba (PINGREY). Joel b in Milford, Conn., 5-28-1778, d 1823. Azuba d in 1845 in Louisiana. Elisha here in 1827, md in 1844, Henrietta JONES b 11-25-1823 and had 9 ch. Elisha md later Elizabeth Church b Greenbrier Co., W.Va., 11-5-1835 and had 2 ch. She had md previously in 1853 Harry SYDENSTRICKER and had 5 ch. She was dau. of Woodward & Mary (GABBART) CHURCH. She md Elisha in 1872.

GRUBER, DANIEL b Mannheim, Prussia in 1830, son of Peter b in Germany in 1798 & Barbara (METZ) b in 1799. Daniel md in 1852 in Noble Co., O., Louisa RUCH, b in Elsass in 18 . Her father b in 1812 came to Marietta in 1844. Her mother Sarah (SALMON) b 1812, d 1870. Daniel & Louise had 11 ch.

HOLCHUW, JACOB b Noble Co., 1840, son of Andrew b in Germany in 1812, here in Penna. in 1830 & wife Sophia (SCHENK) of Pa. Jacob md Caroline MOOTZ in 1872.

LAFON, H.J. b Giles Co., Va. in 1839, son of Enoch & Frances (HARLESS). He md Jemima MOONEY, dau. of Jacob & Mary (HUGHES), former wife of Thomas MORDICK.

MORRISON, ANDREW b 7-29-1820, Greenbrier Co., Va., to this county with parents when a child. He was son of Richard & Mary (BRINDLE). James md Elizabeth BRAMMER, dau. of James & Sarah (SIMMONS) and had 4 ch.

O'NEILL, HUGH b in now Noble Co., O., 6-1-1830, son of John b near Dublin in 1798 & Ann (HORTON) b 2-3-1825. John was son of Hugh O'Neill and wife b near Dublin, Ire. who came to Pittsburgh, Pa. in 1810. then to Noble Co. and d in Muskingum CO. in 1852. Hugh, Jr md Sarah BRAMMER, the dau. of Edmon & Nina (HENRY) both b in Cabell Co., Va., he on 3-12-1813 and she on 7-7-1813. They had 3 ch and 1 adopted child, Rosa Day. The Brammers from Va. Nina b in 1838.

ROWE, JOHN M. b Noble Co., O., 5-18-1848, son of David b in 1776 in Caroline Co., Md. & Mary (MILLER) b in 1800; to Belmont and Noble Co., O. then came here. John md Laura McCONNELL, dau. of Harrison & Martha (BLACKBURN). Harrison b in Pa., 10-9-1826; to this county in 1840. Martha b in Greenup Co., Ky. 9-9-1835, dau. of Jerry Blackburn a pioneer here; d in Alabama. They had a dau.

RUSSELL, JOHN b in this county, 10-6-1842, son of Samuel b in Greenbrier Co., Va., 3-5-1801. He md 1st Miss Irwin who d in 1840. He md 2nd Susan WEST b 1-1-1822, dau. of John who went from Va. to Jackson Co., O. in 1835. John Russell md Eva Stewart in Aid Twp., dau. of William of this county and b in 1850. 3 ch.

SINGER, MARK b in Windsor Twp., 8-4-1810, son of Thomas & Sarah (HUGHES). Mark md in Rome Twp., in 1842, to Irena GILLETT b 4-24-1823, dau. of Joel b 5-28-1778 & Azuba (PINGREY) b 9-26-1787. Mark & Irena had 9 ch. Members of Methodist Ch.

TEMPLETON, MARTIN b in Union Twp., 1-2-1845, son of C.T. & Rebecca (MORRISON). He md in 1877 Adella KIMBALL b 7-12-1855, dau. of John R. & Elizabeth (SMITH).

WILGUS, WILLIAM b Union Twp., son of Charles & Elizabeth (LAFFOON) pioneers here. He md Catherine DUNFEE in 1857, b Monroe Co., O., 7-5-1834, dau. of John & Sarah (WILLIAMS). They had 5 ch.

Hamilton Township

BOMER, JOHN B. b Washington Co., O., 4-30-1817. He md in 1850 Eliza BURGESS b in this county, 6-12-1831, dau. of James & Mary (DAVISSON). They had 8 ch.

PIONEER TRAILS

While searching for your ancestors who came west during the early 1800 migration, I am sure more than once you have wondered by what route they came west. I recently came across a list of roads and trails that were used by the settlers and I want to share it with you.

During colonial days when pioneers moved south or west, they followed trails made by animals or Indians, along the rivers and creeks where food, firewood, water and shelter were the most abundant. Suppose you are searching for an ancestor known to have left Pennsylvania heading for Tennessee, but you can't find him. He could have decided to settle along the trail. He may have traveled farther than his original destination, or he may have died en route. The following list of principal trails might provide a clue as to where to continue your search. In this regard a good reference project for the genealogist would be to obtain a relief map of the United States and mark the trails.

1- The Warrior's Path. (also called the Wilderness Trail, The Great Indian Warpath and the Tennessee Trail) This trail led from Philadelphia across the Susquehanna River to Lancaster, York, and Gettysburg, Pa. then to Hagerstown, Md. and Winchester Va. down the Shenandoah Valley to Staunton, Va. then along the trough between the main mountain ranges of the Appalachians into the valleys of western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee, ending at Chattanooga. A branch of this trail turned north into Kentucky, through the Cumberland Gap, and ending at Portsmouth, Ohio and Louisville, Kentucky.

2- The Gallipolis Trail, left the Warrior's Trail near Staunton, Va. in the Shenandoah Valley, following the valleys of the New and Kanawha Rivers to the junction with the Ohio River at Gallipolis, Ohio.

3- Braddock's Road, led from Maryland to Pittsburgh, Pa. along what is now U.S. Route 40.

4- The Old Trading Path of Parson from Philadelphia, Pa. went west to Lancaster, Carlisle, Bedford and Greenburg ending at Pittsburgh, Pa. (about the same route the Pennsylvania Turnpike follows)

5- The Occaneechi Path led from Bermuda Hundred on the James River, through Petersburg to an Indian town on the Roanoke River about where it crosses over into North Carolina and South Carolina to Augusta, Georgia, where it connected to other trails.

6- The Natchez Trace, leads from Nashville, Tenn. south to Natchez, Mississippi where it connected with other trails.

7- The Lower Creek Trading Path, ran from Greenville, Miss. east through Birmingham, Ala. Macon, Ga. to Augusta, Ga. with important branches to Savannah, Ga. and St. Augustine, Fla. This Path connected directly to the Warrior and Occaneechi paths.

8- The National Road ran from Philadelphia, Pa. through Baltimore, Md. Frederick, Md. Wheeling, W. Va. Columbus, Oh. Richmond, Indianapolis and Terre Haute, Indiana to St. Louis, Mo. It was the most extensively used trail of all.

9- The Buffalo Trace connected with the Warrior's Path at Louisville, Ky. up thru Indiana, passing through New Albany, Paoli, Greenwich, Washington to Vincennes, Ind. on the Wabash River. Sixty percent of all settlers going to Indiana used this trail.

10- The Old Chicago Road led from Indianapolis to Chicago passing through Crawfordsville, Covington and Williamsport on the Wabash River, Ind. it was intersected south of Williamsport by the Lafayette Road which ran north from Vincennes, passing through Sullivan, Terre Haute, Gallatin and Covington.

11- Old Connecticut Path ran from Boston through Worcester, Springfield, Mass. to Albany, N. Y. where it joined the Mohawk Trail to Lake Erie.

12- The Mohawk Trail led from Albany, N.Y. to the western end of Lake Erie passing through Utica, Syracuse, Auburn and Batavia, N. Y.

13- The Great Trail led from Pittsburgh, Pa. to Detroit, Mich. by way of Wooster, Fremont and the Reisen River. This was an extension of Braddock's Road.

14- The Cataba Trail started at Charleston, S.C. to eastern Tenn. It connected with the Occaneechi Path at Columbia, S.C. and the Warrior's Path of Kentucky at its termination.
