## Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) Opens New Library



On Friday July 23, the OGS board and staff welcomed the community, state officials, and the many who had

donated generously to the library fund, to join in officially cutting the ribbon on the new building, which is located just one mile east of I-71 on Ohio Rt 97. That is the Bellville exit. The new address is:

The construction of the 2.5 million dollar building took about a year. The ground breaking was in May 2009 and the move to the new building started immediately after Memorial Day this year. This spacious new building is located on about 7 acres that was donated to the society. There is plenty of room to

expand at either end. There are already dreams of adding an auditorium, on the west end of the building, that could accommodate large groups for seminars and other programs.

With the opening of the beautiful new OGS library, the society logo has been updated. Some printers had a problem duplicating the color gradient in the old logo. The outer triangle was removed to show that there are no barriers to the reach of OGS and its goals. The new logo appears above the main entrance of the new library.

### New Lineage Group: Century Families of Lawrence County, Ohio

In March the Lawrence County Genealogical Society decided to follow the example of the OGS, to form an additional lineage group to recognize ancestors who were either born in or moved to Ohio at any time during the period starting at the cutoff date for Settlers and Builders thru the year ending 100 years ago. For OGS the start date is Jan. 1, 1861 and for Lawrence County the start date is Jan. 1, 1871. For both groups the ending date will always be 100 years ago. For those being recognized at the first inductions, the ending date is Dec. 31, 1910. Next year the cutoff will be Dec. 31, 1911 and so on.

An inquiry got the answer that OGS was going with a gold and green color scheme for their medals. With that info we proceeded to design our medal. Above is the proof sent back by the medal supplier. It will have a green ribbon.

It should be easy for a lot of you with Lawrence County ancestors to prove the lineage for Century Families. Most born after 1870 lived long enough to have a death certificate. If they didn't live that long, the 1880 census shows age and relationships in the family and the 1900 shows relationships and usually the birth month and year.

The society will be happy to help in collecting local documents. We have 5 or 6 applications for this year and hope to have many more for next year. Call, email or write to the editor, and he will get the forms to you.

### REMAINS OF MRS. ROHN

The remains of Mrs. Theora Rohn, the beloved wife of Dr. George Rohn of Arabia, arrived here on the 8:30 N. & W. train Tuesday evening and were conveyed to the home of Deputy Sheriff and Mrs. Glenn Sloan in the \*\*onlin flats at Second and Drury Lane, where the last sad rites were conducted this morning by Rev. Davies of the First Baptist church.

The funeral was private but her legion of friends were given the opportunity of casting a farewell look upon one they so well loved and esteemed.

The deceased's maiden name was Sloan, she being a sister of Jas. M. Sloan, husband of Mrs. Amy Sloan of Eakins and Sloan, the milliners and father of Deputy Sheriff Glenn Sloan. She was born in the county forty-two years ago, and has ever been one of the county's most respected and best beloved citizens.

She and Dr. Rohn were married twenty-four years ago and their home life has been one most beautiful, each ever striving to make things pleasant for the other.

Mrs. Rohn was one of those kind, good women who at all times thought of others before herself and she had not an acquaintance but what was her staunch friend and admirer. Hers was indeed a true Christian life, and there will be many a sad heart throughout Lawrence county and elsewhere when her death becomes known.

### DEAD AT PROCTORVILLE FUNERAL HELD SATURDAY IN MEMORIAM

Mrs. Adaline Miriam Robison, aged 68 years, wife of J. W. Robison and mother of County Auditor A. C. Robison and Deputy County Auditor, Chester Robison, died at the family home in Quaker Bottom, about five miles above Proctorville, on Thursday July 7, 1910, at 3 o'clock p. m.

The funeral was held from the family home Saturday morning at 10 o'clock, the Rev. Foltz of Proctorville M. E. church officiating. The pall bearers were the three sons, Arno, Ralph and

Chester, C. H. Kouns, Chas. McClure and S. E. Crawford, who with heavy hearts deposited all that was mortal of the wife and mother in the family lot of Rome cemetery.

Mrs. Robison had been in failing health for the past two years but only a few months ago, did her illness assume grave proportions. She suffered greatly, but bore it all with that patience and fortitude that had characterized her actions through life. And while the husband and children realized that mother was very ill, they did not think that the end was so near. She sat up only a short time before her death but a sudden attack of nervousness aggravated by her weakened condition, severed the chord of life and she died, suddenly on Thursday afternoon, before the family and nurse could hardly realize what was happening.

Let us, if possible, gather up the elements of the life of the departed and weave of them a picture for the walls of memory. Adaline Mariam Stark was born June 4, 1842, at Florence, Penn., and hence had just past her 68th milestone. She was the daughter of James and Margaret Stark and is the last of her immediate family, save two sisters, Miss Etta Stark of Stubenville and Mrs. Emma Gault of Fernwood, Ohio. Her parents moved to Monroe county, Ohio, when she was a small girl and on April 20th 1864 she was united in marriage to Mr. James W. Robison. Of this union there were born seven children, all of whom are living. They are Mrs. C. W. McClure, Mrs. C. H. Kouns, Ralph R and Miss Margaret of Huntington, W. Va., Miss Emma of Sharon, Penn., Arno C. and Chester of Ironton, Ohio.

The family moved to Lawrence county twenty years ago and have since that time resided on their farm in Quaker Bottom.

born in Germany April 11, 1833 and consequently was 77 years, 2 months and 17 days old at the time of his death. He came to the country at an early age and located at Hanging Rock. He was one of the first residents of Ironton and for many years conducted a merchant tailoring establishment in this city. He retired from business in 1900, the condition of his health preventing further business activity. Mr. Dettmar was married to Miss Charlotte Bester in August 1885 and eight children were born to them, two of whom died in infancy. Henry Dettmar, Jr., died about two years ago. The widow and the following children survive: Fred, Marguerite, Anna, Clara and Mary Dettmar all of this city.

Mr. Dettmar was a life long member of the German Reformed church and was a splendid citizen. His family has the deepest sympathy of all in their bereavement.

The funeral services were held at 9 o'clock Friday morning at the late home on south Third street. The interment was in Woodland cemetery.

### **COL PHILLIPS DIED SUNDAY**

Col. John Phillips one of the best known citizens of Ironton and Lawrence county, died shortly after the midnight hour Sunday morning after a long, severe and very trying illness and his passing will be learned with genuine regret everywhere the genial, wholesouled gentleman was known. The death of Col. Phillips had been expected for some time, his illness from its inception having been extremely critical. A complication of diseases, the natural infirmities of age and the hardships and misadventures (*sic*) experienced in the Civil War, contributed to his death. During all his trying illness Col. Phillips bore his sufferings as few men do and every act of attention and loving kindness from the devoted watchers at his bedside was graciously and kindly acknowledged. All that these loving hands could do was done for the sufferer's relief.

Col. John Phillips was born at Lancaster, O., in 1843 and in consequence was 67 years of age. When a mere child his parents moved to Waverly, O., where they resided until the deceased had reached the age of eighteen years.

At this age he was one of the first to volunteer in the Union army and he served until the close of the war with credit and distinction. After the war he went to Nashville and was employed by the L. and N. railroad. He remained in Nashville for two years and then he returned to Waverly where he was married. Learning the blacksmith trade Mr. Phillips worked awhile in Ross county and then returned to the Pike county farm. In 1873 he came to Ironton and had been a continuous resident of this city until his death.

Engaging in the blacksmith business Col. Phillips was soon compelled to branch out and enlarge. The splendid carriage works located on Second street is the result of his competency, attention to business and honest dealing. A vehicle bearing the "Phillips" name was a guarantee of its quality.

Col. Phillips was an active member of Dick Lambert Post G. A. R. and had frequently served as Commander of the Post.

The deceased is survived by his wife and the following children: Harry of Tampa, Fla., John of Huntington, Frank and Walter of this city

The funeral services were held this afternoon at the family home on Adams street. The interment which was in Woodland cemetery was conducted privately.

The sons of the deceased, John, Harry and Walter, his brother Daniel Phillips, George Burch and Dr. Williams were the pall bearers.

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### **MR. TURLEY DEAD**

Elsewhere in today's paper mention of the illness of C. H. Turley is made. After it had been printed it was learned that Mr. Turley had died and concerning his death the Huntington Advertiser had the following:

C. H. Turley, aged 64, died at his home near Proctorville at one o'clock today.

Mr. Turley was one of the best known citizens of Lawrence county and had many relative in Huntington. C. H. Hall being a brother in-law. He was a veteran of the Union army, and was prominent in G. A. R. circles. He was president of the Fifth West Virginia organization for twenty years, and was commander of Bell Post, G. A. R.

He was a member of the Methodist church from boyhood and was prominent in Masonic circles.

He is survived by two daughters, four brothers and one sister.
